

Iowa's Electric Cooperatives Discuss Important Issues at Legislative Reception

ore than 160 directors, managers and employees from Iowa's electric cooperatives discussed priorities with nearly 90 state legislators on January 11 during the annual Welcome Back Legislative Reception in downtown Des Moines. The Iowa Association of Electric Cooperatives hosted the annual reception in conjunction with the Iowa Biotechnology Association, the Iowa Communications Alliance, the Iowa Institute for Cooperatives and FUELIowa.

The event provided a valuable opportunity to meet with state legislators at the beginning of the 2022 Legislative Session to discuss issues that impact rural electric cooperatives and the communities we serve. For example, as the Legislature and Governor prioritize tax cuts this session, we're asking for a correction to a 2018 legislative oversight that left electric cooperatives out of a tax exemption on digital good and services. This unfair tax burden has resulted in hundreds of thousands of dollars in increased taxes for rural electric cooperatives.

In the coming months, the Iowa General Assembly will be addressing a multitude of issues, including energy-related matters that are central to Iowa's rural economy. Beginning with the Welcome Back Legislative Reception, electric co-op directors, managers and staff will again be important advocates for a balanced approach in addressing energy issues. Collectively, Iowa's locally owned electric cooperatives provide affordable, reliable, safe and environmentally responsible power to more than 650,000 Iowans throughout all 99 counties every day.

Scholarships Reminder



Southwest Iowa REC will once again be offering scholarships for the 2021-2022 school year to graduating high school seniors.

At Southwest Iowa REC, we recognize that a key element of the membercooperative relationship is the trust that you place with us to respect the privacy and confidentiality of your personal information. We are committed to providing you with the highest quality of electric service. While personal information about you is fundamental to our ability to do this, your privacy is also very important to us.

Therefore, Southwest Iowa REC will not disclose to non-affiliated third parties any information, including personal financial or consumption histories, without the expressed consent of the member/consumer. The Cooperative does reserve the right to use information for purposes relevant to prudent engineering and design practices and power procurement practices, which are consistent with the industry requirements, and for the betterment of the Cooperative and its membership, as a whole.

We restrict access to non-public personal information for all memberconsumers to only those employees or affiliates who need to know specific information to provide products and services to the member/consumer. We maintain physical, electronic and procedural safeguards that, to the best of our abilities, provide prudent and sufficient protection for all non-public personal information.

Information shall not be released to any third party until such time as the member/consumer approves, in writing, such authorization. Forms for the release of information may be obtained from the Cooperative office.

Southwest Iowa REC may collect non-public personal information from the following:

- a. Information we receive from you on applications or forms.
- b. Information regarding payment histories, consumption history, demand history or capacity requirements.



ICE ON POWER LINES IS A WEIGHTY SUBJECT

When it comes to getting electricity across power lines and into homes, ice can be a force to be reckoned with.



ICE ON DISTRIBUTION LINES

Ice can quickly lead to broken power poles and other pole equipment. Ice can also make falling tree branches 30x heavier and much more likely to break power lines.

ON A 300-FOOT SPAN OF 1-INCH-THICK POWER LINES

- 1/2 inch of ice adds 281 pounds of weight
- 1 inch of ice adds 749 pounds of weight
- 2 inches of ice adds 2,248 pounds of weight

WHEN ICE MELTS

Melting ice can cause power outages. If ice on the bottom (neutral) line melts before the lines above, it can cause the lines to touch.

OTHER ICE FACTS

- Damage can begin when ice exceeds 1/4 of an inch
- 1/2 inch of ice can cause a line to sag up to 12 inches
- Pressure can also be caused by a broken tree limb
- Both ice and melting ice can cause power outages

Beware of phone scams!!

Every year, thousands of people lose money to telephone scams — from a few dollars to their life savings. Scammers will say anything to cheat people out of money. Some seem very friendly — calling you by your first name, making small talk, and asking about your family. They may claim to work for a company you trust, or they may send mail or place ads to convince you to call them. Keep these tips in mind when dealing with questionable phone calls.

Fraud prevention tips:

- The REC would never contact member by phone and ask for their account number. If someone calls you asking for sensitive information including your utility account number, SSN, credit card number or bank account details, please hang up and call the REC directly to verify the call. (Do not use any phone number supplied by the possible scammer; call the REC using one of the phone numbers we have provided to you.)
- Do not accept offers from anyone, including those claiming to be REC employees, to pay your bill or provide any other service for a fee. If something sounds too good to be true, it probably is.
- REC members who have delinquent accounts receive multiple notifications over the course of several weeks prior to electric service disconnection – never just a single notification immediately before disconnection.
- If a REC lineman or member service rep comes to your door, they should be



Favorite Recipe: Lemon Cake

Lemon Cake

- 1 box lemon cake mix 1 pkg Jello lemon instant pudding 4 eggs
- ¹/₄ C. orange juice 2 C. powdered sugar 1 Tbs. vegetable oil



Icing:

- ³⁄₄ C. vegetable oil
- 3/4 C. water

Cake:

- 1) Mix cake mix and pudding together in large mixing bowl.
- 2) Add eggs, vegetable oil, and water. Beat 10 minutes.
 - 3) Bake at 350° for 40 minutes.
 - 4) While cake is baking prepare icing.
- 5) While cake is still warm, prick cake with fork and pour icing mixture over cake.

Icing:

1) Mix orange juice, powdered sugar, and vegetable oil together. Mix well.
