for government service and leadership after attending the weeklong trip to Washington, D.C. The 2022 Electric Cooperative Youth Tour is slated for June 18-24 next summer.



Both homes have the same total energy consumption in kilowatt hours (8.5 kWh), but Home A used all of the appliances at once, creating higher demand.

they use each month, or energy "consumption". But did you realize that the way you and your neighbors use electricity is just as important as how much electricity you use each month? The higher the "demand" for energy placed on Southwest Iowa REC and its power supplier during peak times of the month, the higher the expenses are for your cooperative. This in turn drives up the cost for all members.

average demand of our members. Peak demand refers to the time of day when the demand for electricity is highest. This is typically during the evening, from 4:00 p.m. - 9:00 p.m., when families return home from work or school, cook dinner and use appliances the most. Using electricity during this peak demand period often costs more to both Southwest Iowa REC and our members.

How could this impact a member in the future?

In the past you have been able to save money by turning off the lights or taking advantage of our energy efficiency programs. In the future, you may be able to lower your bill by coordinating the number of appliances you operate at the same time. Staggering the use of major appliances throughout the day reduces the demand on the cooperative's system.

SBS Inspections, Inc. Testing and Treating Poles This Fall

Southwest Iowa REC has contracted with SBS Inspections, Inc. from Olathe, Colorado, to perform pole testing and treatment this fall on one-tenth of our system; approximately 5,000 poles or 250 miles of line. SBS Inspections Inc. will be testing and treating poles in the following areas:

Adams County - Mercer and Grant townships

Decatur County - Grand River township

Page County - Grant and Valley townships

Ringgold County - Monroe, Liberty, Washington, Tingley, and Union townships

Taylor County - Platte township

SBS Inspections, Inc. inspectors will dig a hole at least 18 inches deep and wide enough to ensure a proper inspection and treatment of the pole. After exposing the wood, the poles are inspected and treated with a wood preservative, and then the hole is backfilled and the dirt tamped into place. The ground line treatment with wood preservative should extend the pole's life at least another 10 to 20 years. Poles that fail inspection are scheduled for replacement by our crews which provides you with even more reliable electric service in the future.



Unlike the older-style electricity meters that are read manually, smart meters use sensors to measure the amount of electricity flowing in and out of your home.





Southwest Iowa REC has utilized smart meters since 2008 when Automated Metering Infrastructure (AMI) replaced the older electro-mechanical meters in use at that time.

Apple Crumble

Prep time: 20 minutes Cook time: 40 minutes

Ingredients

- 6 cups Apples (Peeled and chopped 1" pieces) ¼ cup sugar
 - 2 tablespoons flour
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon or apple pie spice

Crumble topping:

- 1 cup flour
 - 1/3 cup white sugar
 - 1/3 cup brown sugar
 - ½ teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/8 teaspoon ground ginger
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- ½ cup unsalted butter cold, cut into cubes

Instructions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 375°F.
- 2. Place all topping ingredients in a medium bowl. Use a pastry cutter to cut in butter until the mixture starts to stick together, about 3 minutes. Place in the fridge while preparing the apples.
- 3. Place apples in a 2qt baking dish and toss with sugar, flour, and cinnamon.
- 4. Sprinkle topping over top and bake 35-40 minutes or until golden and apples are soft.
- 5. Serve warm with ice cream.
